

Founded in 1970, the Sorbonne Nouvelle, which emerged from the former Faculty of Arts of the Université de Paris, combines the heritage of the Sorbonne with a spirit of continual innovation.

Offering an extensive range of high-level multidisciplinary courses in the fields of Arts, Humanities, Languages, and Social Sciences, which benefit from the support of its 30 research units, the Sorbonne Nouvelle awards Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral degrees that attract students and researchers from all over the world. The Bibliothèque Sorbonne Nouvelle is located on the new Nation campus designed by Christian de Portzamparc (Pritzker price 1994). Its collections of 600,000 books and journals are specialised in the disciplines taught at the Université Sorbonne Nouvelle: languages, literature, arts, humanities and social sciences. Covering an area of 5,000 m², it has 1,100 seats, 38 group work rooms and 3 training rooms.



MELCom, the Middle East Librarians Committee, was established in the United Kingdom in the late 1960s to promote all aspects of Middle Eastern librarianship, book collecting, the book trade and publishing.

Through international connections, MELCom held its inaugural joint conference with French colleagues in Aix-en-Provence, France, in 1979—a milestone that paved the way for subsequent gatherings. Following a second conference outside the UK at Staatsbibliothek zu Berlin in 1981, the feasibility and benefits of organising an annual international conference became evident.

MELCom fostered a robust exchange of ideas related to librarianship and book research within a welcoming and professional atmosphere, complemented by informal activities and scholarly exploration. The diverse scope of MELCom International's activities eventually led to its independent operation alongside MELCom UK.

Since 1993, MELCom International has been operating independently of MELCOM UK, maintaining its own Constitution to provide a legal framework for its endeavours.
